Public Interest and Awareness of the News

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BUSH-GORBACHEV SUMMIT EVOKES MODERATE INTEREST

Thirty-eight percent of the American public followed the Bush-Gorbachev summit "very closely" according to a new Times Mirror News Interest Index released today. While interest in the Washington summit was almost twice as great as public interest in last December's meeting of the two world leaders off the coast of Malta (21%), the latest summit failed to draw as much attention as last month's top story, the Mideast hostage release (46%).

Although this past week's meeting generated only moderate public attention, it surpassed interest in many other Bush Administration activities that have been covered by the Times Mirror News Interest Index. February's Colombian drug summit was followed very closely by 22%, the education summit in September 1989 by 15%. Only the Bush proclamation of a war on drugs last summer attracted more public attention (42%).

At least part of the reason for the subdued public response to the summit was that it failed to engage the interest of younger Americans. Among the 18-30's age group, the summit was the number two story of the month, with only 26% following very closely. Among 30-49 year olds, 35% followed the summit very closely, compared to 49% among those 50 and older.

The floods in Texas and other Southwestern states rivaled the summit for public attention in May. Thirty-four percent of Times Mirror respondents said they followed news of this natural disaster very closely. In the South and among younger adults, interest in the floods surpassed interest in the Bush-Gorbachev meetings. Forty-three percent of Southerners followed very closely news about the floods in their home region, compared to 36% who paid close attention to the summit. Among those under 30, 29% followed the story very closely. Gorbachev's visit may have deflected some American attention from one of his biggest problems back home. Public interest in the tensions between Moscow and the Baltic Republics slipped this month. Twenty-one percent said they were following this story closely, compared to 28% in each of the last three preceding months.

Nonetheless, Gorbachev's chief political rival was able penetrate the public's consciousness during the week of the summit. As many as 20% of the Times Mirror respondents were able to say on an unprompted basis why Boris Yeltsin had been in the news recently. Among college graduates and among "serious" news consumers, 45% correctly identified Yeltsin as the new leader of the Russian Republic.

The budget summit got far less public attention than did the diplomatic one, even though the economic summit got a considerable amount of air time on network evening news in May. Fewer than one in five (18%) said they paid very close attention to the special meetings between the Administration and congressional leaders to find ways to reduce the budget deficit.

The other major economic story of the month, the continuing saga of the savings and loan scandal, achieved the same level of public attention (18%), despite the fact that the budget summit received four times as much air time on network television news. (Four percent of all network air time was devoted to the economic summit compared to one percent for the S&L crisis. The Bush-Gorbachev summit was the top network news story, registering 6% of network air time).

Interest in news about both economic problems was sharply higher among those over fifty years of age, and among better educated people, but these stories attracted the most attention among serious news consumers -- those who represent the core audience for programs such as MacNeil Lehrer, NPR and intellectual magazines, such as *The Atlantic, Harper's* and *The New Yorker*. 35% and 34% of *serious* news consumers followed very closely the budget summit and the S&L crisis, respectively.

The savings and loan scandal has not yet become personalized for most Americans, even though a large majority (79%) know taxpayers will ultimately bear the burden of the cost of the financial debacle. Fewer than one in four (23%) are aware of a savings and loan bank in their community that has been taken over by the federal government. The incidence of such reports was only somewhat higher in the West (32%).

Racial tension in New York City was followed very closely by 17% of the public at large, but interest in these reports surpassed interest in all other stories among non-white Americans. Thirty-eight percent of non-whites paid close attention to reports of racial tension emanating from the Bensonhurst verdicts and the black boycott of Korean grocers in Brooklyn, New York.

Those who followed this story closely gave the press low marks for the way the story was reported. Only seven percent rated this news coverage as *excellent* - well below the 25% excellent mark given the typical story tracked in the monthly news interest index. As many as

58% gave coverage of racial problems in New York City a negative rating of "only fair" or "poor". In contrast, coverage of the Bush-Gorbachev summit received better than average ratings with 33% rating it excellent and only 14% fair or poor.

Renewed Palestinian rioting in Israel and the elections in Romania evoked little interest among Americans. Eleven percent said they closely followed the Palestinian disturbances that followed the incident in Gaza in which a deranged Israeli killed seven Palestinians. Even fewer (6%) paid close attention to news about the elections in Romania. The Mideast story achieved a significantly larger audience among serious news consumers (23%), but the Romanian elections failed to attract much attention even among this most sophisticated audience segment (12%).

Other Public Interests

A third of the public (32%) said they had "heard a lot" about legislative attempts to curb cigarette advertising, and 27% had "heard a lot" about Senate passage of a bill to ban assault rifles. Only 21% had "heard a lot" about the Clean Air Act, now making its way through Congress. Overall awareness -- having heard a lot <u>or</u> something -- about each of these legislative efforts was considerably higher; further restrictions on cigarette advertising (76%), Senate bill to ban assault rifles (74%), and the Clean Air Act (65%).

Nearly two in three (62%) had heard something about the problems of Neil Bush, the President's son, whose role as director of a failed savings and loan bank has been called into question. But very few said they had heard a lot about this story (14%).

The Hype Index

More Americans say they have heard a lot about the "Dick Tracy" movie than say they have heard a lot about ABC's unusual series, "Twin Peaks". Two-thirds of the public are already familiar with the soon-to-be-released "Dick Tracy" movie, and 27% say they have heard a lot about it, compared to 62% and 24%, respectively, for "Twin Peaks".

"Dick Tracy's" edge in public attention over "Twin Peaks" is a result of more awareness among those under 30 and the less well-educated.

SURVEY METHODOLOGY

The survey results are based on telephone interviews conducted under the direction of Princeton Survey Research Associates among 1,231 adults, 18 years of age or older, during the period of June 1-4, 1990. Interviewing services were provided by The Gallup Organization. For results based on the total sample, one can say with 95% confidence that the error attributable to sampling and other random effects is plus or minus 3 percentage points. In addition to sampling error, one should bear in mind that question wording and practical difficulties in conducting surveys can introduce error or bias into the findings of opinion polls.
