PUBLIC LISTENS AS BUSH'S LIPS MOVE

Americans paid a lot of attention to George Bush recently when he changed his mind about taxes, but few have changed their minds about him as a consequence.

Bush's reversal on taxes was the most closely followed story in June with 30% of the public saying they followed this story *very closely*. The same Times Mirror survey found 64% of the public approving of the way the President Bush has been handling his job -- a rating that is statistically equal to the results of a Times Mirror nationwide survey in late May - early June which measured the president's popularity.

This is only the second time in the past year that news out of the White House has been the top news event of the month. (The Bush plan to combat drugs was the number one story of August 1989 when it was followed very closely by 40%). One measure of the reach of the tax story is found in the fact that at the outset of the Times Mirror interview nearly seven in ten (68%) were able to volunteer that Bush had changed his mind about taxes recently.

All of this interest and penetration not withstanding, it may be telling that only 2% of the public cited Bush's tax policy as the *most important* news event of the month. (Mandela's visit (12%), changes in the Soviet Union (9%), Eastern Europe (8%), and the earthquake in Iran (8%) were all mentioned more often.

The fires that raged across Southern California last month attracted almost as much public attention as the President's new position on taxes and significantly more attention than a number of important Supreme Court rulings and the visit of Nelson Mandela. Twenty-nine percent reported that they followed news accounts of this disaster very closely last month. Understandably, interest in this story was much higher in the West where it was the top story of the month with 45% saying they followed it very closely.

Nelson Mandela's widely celebrated visit to a number of major American cities attracted a modest amount of public attention. Twenty-four percent said they followed the story very closely. There are some signs of Mandela "burn out". More Americans paid closer attention to the news of his release from prison back in March (30%) and the current survey found one in four saying in a free response question that there was *too much* coverage of the Mandela visit.

Lack of interest in the Mandela story did not extend to blacks. No fewer than 58% of blacks said they followed news of the South African leader's visit to the U.S. very closely, while just 9% said the story was overcovered.

The Supreme Court ruling on anti-flag burning legislation and congressional efforts to amend the constitution evoked half as much interest as did news about the high court's 1989 flag burning decision. A year ago, 50% said they followed very closely news about the Court's flag burning decision. Only 24% said they paid close attention to news about the June 1990 ruling.

Americans 50 years of age and older were much more interested in the flag burning debate (35%) than younger Americans (18%) and flag burning news drew more attention in the South (30%).

One indication of the limits of interest in the flag burning story is seen in the fact that only half the public (52%) knew that the Court had ruled that anti-flag burning legislation was unconstitutional. Thirty-one percent thought the reverse was true and 17% said they did not know.

The nature of the high court's abortion ruling is much more widely known to Americans. Sixtysix percent of the Times Mirror sample knew of the parental notification ruling.

News about the Supreme Court's "right to die" ruling attracted as much interest as did the flag decision -- 24% said they followed this story very closely. The assisted suicide of (Janet) Adkins attracted about the same level of attention -- 22% said they followed the story very closely. The "right to die" issue appears to be of more interest to women and older people than to men and younger adults.

There is less interest in news of Mayor Barry's trial than there was in the initial story of his arrest. In the current survey, 22% said they were following news about the trial very closely. News about Barry's arrest in February attracted 30% of the American public. As was the case a few months ago, blacks expressed considerably more interest in this story. Forty percent of blacks said they were following news of the Mayor's trial very closely.

While only little more than one in five overall are keeping a close eye on the trial, the broadcast of the FBI's hidden camera video of the DC mayor has been seen, at least in part, by two-thirds of the public. The survey indicates that viewing the tapes has not made the public any more sympathetic to the mayor's position. Most (52%) viewers reported no change of sympathies and a plurality of the public (33% to 13%) reported that they have become *less*, not more, sympathetic to Barry's position as a result of having watched the tapes.

The devastating earthquake in Iran was closely followed by one in five Americans, but the Times Mirror survey indicates that many more are aware of the dimensions of this disaster. Four in ten (40%) were able to cite in a free response question the approximate number of reported deaths.

Clear majorities of the public were knowledgeable about other major stories in June. Fifty-eight percent of the public knew of the monetary unification of East and West Germany. Half of the public knew of the Hubble space telescope's problems and half were aware of Bush's veto of the worker leave bill.

Respondents under 30 years of age were less likely to give the correct answers in response to each of these questions. Only 41% knew of Bush's veto (vs. 53% among those 30 & older). Thirtyeight percent of young adults knew why Hubble was in the news and 49% knew what occurred recently in Germany (compared to 56% and 60%, respectively, among those over 30 years of age).

The financial woes of Donald Trump attracted little interest among young and old with just 16% saying they followed this story closely. However, this represents something of an increase in public interest in affairs of the New York developer whose marital problems drew the close attention of 12% of the public in February.

Now, as then, the public complains of media overkill with regard to Trump. Twenty-seven percent volunteered that he had received too much coverage last month. But, this is down from the 55% who complained that Ivana and Donald got too much attention when the break up of their marriage was unfolding daily in the tabloids.

News about the AIDS conference in San Francisco drew the smallest audience (9%) of each of the major stories monitored this month. Yet, the Times Mirror Center's monitor of the content of the network evening news finds that the AIDS conference story received more air time in June than any other story save the Mandela visit. News about the conference in San Francisco accounted for 2.4% of the combined air time of the three networks and CNN evening news programming. Mandela received 3.3%, the Iran earthquake 2%, and the flag burning debate 1.9%. The networks spent 1.6% of their air time on this month's top News Interest Index story, the Bush tax increase.

Other issues...

The banning of 2 Live Crew received significant public notice. Forty percent of the Times Mirror sample reported hearing *a lot* about the controversy. By way of comparison, only 14% had heard a lot about the Quebec independence movement. One in four said they heard a lot about World Cup soccer and the spotted owl controversy attracted the attention of 22%.

SURVEY METHODOLOGY

The survey results are based on telephone interviews conducted under the direction of Princeton Survey Research Associates among 1,231 adults, 18 years of age or older, during the period of July 5-8, 1990. Interviewing services were provided by The Gallup Organization in Lincoln, Nebraska. For results based on the total sample, one can say with 95% confidence that the error attributable to sampling and other random effects is plus or minus 3 percentage points. In addition to sampling error, one should bear in mind that question wording and practical difficulties in conducting surveys can introduce error or bias into the findings of opinion polls.
