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AMERICAN PUBLIC RIVETED TO NEWS OF IRAQ AND SAUDI ARABIA

At week's end 66% of the American public said they were following news about the Iraqi invasion and the deployment of American forces to Saudi Arabia *very closely*. Events in the Middle East now dominate public consciousness to an extraordinary degree. An unparalleled 85% of Times Mirror's nationwide telephone sample volunteered this, in an open-ended question, as the most important news event of the month.

This is a significantly higher level of interest than has been recorded for news about other actions involving U.S. armed forces or other major breaking international stories. For example, 60% followed news of the invasion of Panama *very closely*, 58% U.S. air strikes against Libya and 50% the opening of the Berlin Wall. Never before has the Times Mirror News Interest Index recorded a single news story that has been seen as *important* by nearly so many Americans. The previous high watermark on this measure was 56% for the invasion of Panama in January.

Attentiveness to news about gasoline price hikes here at home has attracted nearly as much public interest as the military situation abroad. Fifty-seven percent of the public are following these stories very closely. News about gas price gouging is equally interesting to Americans in all parts of the country, in all age categories, to men and women, and blacks and whites.

The public is not only interested in the Mideast story, but is also reasonably well-informed about it. Two-thirds majorities know that the Soviet Union is supporting U.S. efforts to get Iraq to withdraw from Kuwait (66%) and that other countries will be sending forces to Saudi Arabia to defend against an Iraqi invasion of that oil-rich kingdom (64%).

If Saddam Hussein's army had not invaded Kuwait, news about the condition of the economy would have been the top story of the month. Fully 30% of the public said they were following very closely news about the condition of the economy over the past four weeks. This is an unusually large percentage of Americans to say they have been attentive to economic news. In May, just 18% said they were following very closely news about increasing interest rates and higher inflation.

Public interest in recent efforts by the Administration and Congress to cut the budget deficit was more consistent with past patterns of response. As was found in June, fewer than one in five (18%) said they followed very closely news about this subject.

There was also consistency in the size of the audience for news about the President's nomination of David Souter to the United States Supreme Court. Only sixteen percent said they followed the story very closely. The same number (17%) said they followed very closely news of the Bork nomination when that controversial appointment was dominating the headlines in the fall of 1987. Interest in news about Souter fails to reflect the intensity of interest usually related to stories about the abortion issue. It is of no greater relative interest to women or to young people.

The Marine landing in Liberia attracted the close attention of 27% of the public. Interest in this story showed no clear demographic pattern, except that blacks were somewhat more likely than whites to be interested (33%). This is striking because blacks are much less interested than whites in the situation in the Middle East (67% to 51%).

However, the biggest difference in news interest by race had to do with South Africa. *Forty-seven percent* of blacks said they followed very closely Mandela's announcement that the African National Congress (ANC) would end its armed struggle. In contrast, just 8% of whites did so, resulting in a 12% overall rating for news of the ANC's historic change in policy.

Domestic stories with racial elements showed the same pattern. News of Mayor Barry's mistrial which broke during our interviewing period was followed very closely by 16% of the public on Saturday and Sunday night of this past weekend. However, among African-Americans, 30% followed news of the trial's outcome very closely, compared to 14% among whites.

This is the third measure of public interest in the Mayor's problems in the Times Mirror News Interest Index and the lowest level revealed yet. His arrest in February drew 28%, and his trial in July attracted 22%.

The controversy regarding the racial policies of country clubs that host major golf tournaments attracted a relatively small but racially skewed audience. Nationwide, 15% said they paid close attention to this news - among blacks that figure was 36% (vs 13% among whites).

Also in the world of professional sports, Major League Baseball's decision to compel George Steinbrenner to give up control of the Yankees attracted a meager national audience. Twelve percent said they followed the story very closely. Among men, and in the East, interest was predictably greater but still modest -- 19% and 20% respectively.

Roseanne Barr's controversial rendition of the national anthem attracted a larger audience (21%) than did Steinbrenner, because men and women showed equal interest in this story.

Americans, men and women alike, paid almost no attention to the dismissal of Pakistan's Prime Minister, Benazir Bhutto. Four percent said they followed the story *very* closely and another 14% said they followed the news *fairly* closely.

The public gives the press better than average grades for its coverage of the Mideast situation, despite the fact that there have been few pictures of troops in Saudi Arabia or video accounts of the fighting in Kuwait. Thirty-six percent rated Mideast coverage as excellent. Typically, major national and international stories are given an excellent rating by less than a quarter of Times Mirror respondents.

When asked about information they would like to have regarding the Mideast situation, the public expresses the most interest in hearing more about how other countries are reacting to the situation (37%). Twenty-five percent reported they want to know more about how U.S. troops are being deployed, and another 25% are most interested in the effects of the crisis on gasoline prices and the economy. Only 8% want to know more about the historical background of the Middle East.

SURVEY METHODOLOGY

The survey results are based on telephone interviews conducted under the direction of Princeton Survey Research Associates among 1,213 adults, 18 years of age or older, during the period of August 9-12, 1990. For results based on the total sample, one can say with 95% confidence that the error attributable to sampling and other random effects is plus or minus 3 percentage points. In addition to sampling error, one should bear in mind that question wording and practical difficulties in conducting surveys can introduce error or bias into the findings of opinion polls.
