# PUBLIC INTEREST IN GULF CRISIS UNABATED

Americans remain as attentive as they were a month ago to events in the Persian Gulf. Sixty-three percent of the public are following news about the Iraqi occupation of Kuwait and the deployment of U.S. forces to the Persian Gulf very closely. Our August survey showed an only marginally higher level of interest in Gulf crisis news (66%).

Interest in the main Mideast story is accompanied by a sustained interest in the secondary stories. Fifty-six percent of Americans are following very closely news about rising gasoline prices here at home, compared to 57% a month ago. News about the plight of hostages attracted nearly as many Americans as the principal story. Fifty-seven percent said they have followed very closely news about the Americans and other Westerners detained in Iraq and Kuwait.

The only aspect of this story to garner little public interest was the Helsinki summit which drew the close attention of only one in four Americans (26%). This is much less interest than was the case when Bush and Gorbachev met in Washington in June. At that time 38% said they followed summit news very closely.

Despite the continuing high level of attention paid to the overall Persian Gulf story, there is some evidence of public fatigue with the *amount* of Gulf coverage. As many as 15% of respondents volunteered that there was too much news about the crisis. This is more a measure of discontent with media "overkill" than with a lack of interest in the story itself. Complaints about the amount of coverage were as likely to come from people who are following the story very closely as they were from people who are less attentive to the crisis.

The Gainesville murders was the non-Gulf story that drew the most public attention in the past four weeks. Thirty-six percent of the public said they followed news of these serial killings very closely. This is an unusually high level of public interest for a local crime story. It drew significantly more public attention than other well publicized stories, such as the Stuart case (29%), the attack and sexual assault of the Central park jogger (29%) and the arson in a Bronx social club that killed 38 people.

It also attracted much more public attention this month than did the Watkins murder in New York city. Just one in five (20%) said they followed very closely news about this New York city subway murder. Blacks and older people were more interested than whites and younger people in both the Watkins murder and in the Gainesville killings.

Interest in the reports about the U.S. economy remained at the high level recorded a month ago. Twenty-nine percent said they were following news about the condition of the U.S. economy very closely, compared to 30% a month ago.

Interest in the worsening conditions of the Soviet economy generated little interest among Americans. Only 13% of the Times Mirror sample said they were following accounts of growing economic problems in the Soviet Union very closely. However, first reports of the U.S. Census drew an even smaller audience, with only 7% saying they were highly attentive to these stories. It is of note that the Census story drew more than twice as much interest among blacks than it did among whites (15% vs. 6%).

## *Opinion About Gulf Coverage*

Americans continue to give the press high marks overall for their coverage of the Mideast. Thirty-nine percent rated the coverage as excellent which is higher than the News Interest Index average rating, but not significantly higher than was obtained for this story last month.

Americans back up their generally positive opinion of Gulf coverage with the view that the press has been fair in the way it has treated the story. About two-thirds of the Times Mirror sample expressed that opinion (68%). Very small minorities of the public see the press as either overly critical (10%) or too supportive of American policies in the Gulf (11%).

While the public feels the press has been objective in what it has covered, a plurality feels that the views of Americans who oppose the buildup have not received enough of an airing. Forty percent expressed that opinion, compared to 15% who think that critics of American policies have gotten too much coverage and 35% who think they have received the right amount of coverage.

Divisions of opinion on this subject are especially sharp by demographic groups. Majorities of blacks (52%) and Americans under 30 years of age (55%) feel that dissenting voices have not been sufficiently heard from, while whites (38%) and older people (29%) are far less likely to feel this way. As might be expected, people who take a more dovish position on the Persian Gulf policy are also more apt to think that dissenting voices have not been sufficiently heard (52%).

CNN gets the most mentions from Americans (27%) as the news network doing the best job of covering the crisis in the Gulf. ABC (21%) is in second place. CBS and NBC were named by significantly fewer than cited the other two networks (14% and 13%, respectively).

It should be underscored that CNN gets top honors from the general public despite the fact that this national sample includes both cable and *non-cable* areas.

With regard to "exclusives and firsts", 20% recalled that Dan Rather of CBS got the exclusive interview with Saddam Hussein, while only 5% could recall that Ted Koppel was the first American correspondent to broadcast from Baghdad after the invasion of Kuwait. "Exclusives and firsts" may not affect viewer response as much as some may believe. CNN received the best overall marks for Gulf coverage even among those who knew of Rather and Koppel's achievements.

Saddam Hussein's television meetings with hostages were widely seen by the American public, but their intended effects appear to have backfired. Among the 52% who say they saw the coverage, a 70% majority said the videos made them more likely, not less likely, to favor military action against the Iraqis.

### ***The Public Interest, and Perceptions As they Relate to Policy Views***

Most Americans believe our armed forces were sent to the Gulf to defend the oil supply, not to protect the independence of Saudi Arabia and other Gulf states. Fifty-five percent come to that conclusion based on what they have seen or read, while only 25% feel U.S. forces in the Gulf are there mainly to protect the independence of Gulf countries. Thirteen percent said that both objectives were equally important.

People who believe that U.S. forces are mainly protecting the independence of the Gulf states are much more likely than others to believe that the U.S. should use military force against the Iraqis if the embargo does not succeed (72% vs. 61%).

There is also a correlation between the degree of a person's interest in the news about the Gulf and feelings about the use of force to drive the Iraqis out of Kuwait. Seventy percent of those who are following Gulf news very closely favor the use of force compared to 53% among those who are paying less attention to the story.

Americans who are following the crisis very closely give George Bush a higher than average approval rating (75%). In that connection, Bush's rating at 68% is significantly below what it was in mid-August (76%).

## **SURVEY METHODOLOGY**

The survey results are based on telephone interviews conducted under the direction of Princeton Survey Research Associates among 1,244 adults, 18 years of age or older, during the period of September 10-12, 1990. Interviewing services were provided by The Gallup Organization in Lincoln, Nebraska. For results based on the total sample, one can say with 95% confidence that the error attributable to sampling and other random effects is plus or minus 3 percentage points. In addition to sampling error, one should bear in mind that question wording and practical difficulties in conducting surveys can introduce error or bias into the findings of opinion polls.
