## GAS PRICES RIVAL GULF FOR PUBLIC ATTENTION

The focus of the American public's attention is shifting to the domestic consequences of the Gulf crisis.

Although Iraqi occupation of Kuwait and U.S. troop deployment to the Gulf continues to dominate the consciousness of Americans, news about rising gasoline prices drew nearly as much public interest in September. At the same time, attentiveness to the plight of hostages in the Gulf fell below levels recorded in previous surveys.

Sixty-three percent of the public reported they were following news about the crisis in the Gulf very closely, compared to the 62% who paid close attention to stories about rising gasoline prices. This represents a six percentage point increase in the number of Americans following news of the gas price hike (from 56% a month ago) and no change whatsoever in the proportion of the public following the principal story. In contrast, the percentage of the public paying close attention to hostage news declined from 57% a month ago to 47% currently.

Although the level of public interest in news about gasoline price hikes rivaled interest in the principal Gulf story, Americans continued to cite the Mideast crisis as the *most important* news of the month (68%) and told us that it was the single story they followed most closely (62%).

Despite the intensity of the battle over the budget in Washington, just 34% reported they were following news about attempts to resolve the budget impasse very closely. This is an appreciably higher level of attentiveness to this story than was recorded in July (19%) or May (18%). It should also be noted that while only a third of the public was highly attentive to the budget debate, large percentages of the public were able to volunteer the types of tax increases being considered -- 45% gasoline taxes, 38% cigarette taxes, 40% alcohol taxes.

The principal demographic correlate of interest in attempts to resolve the budget dispute is *age*. Among people under 30 just 20% said they were following news about the debate very closely, while among people 50 and older attentiveness was more than twice as high (46%).

The survey finds that 55% of the public approves of the way President Bush is handling his job and 28% disapprove. In September, the President's approval rating stood at 68% and in August it was 76% in Times Mirror opinion surveys.

All demographic and political groups register increased dissatisfaction with the way the President is handling his duties, but Bush approval ratings have declined by 15 percentage points or more among older people (47% approve), blacks (32%), Democrats (40%) and in the East (49%).

Interest in the confirmation of Judge Souter remained at the low level recorded in previous surveys, despite extensive coverage of the confirmation hearings in September. Only 15% said they followed the story very closely compared to 16% in July. Furthermore, just 51% of the Times Mirror sample could correctly identify Souter on an unprompted basis. Among people under 30 years of age only 26% knew who Souter was, compared to 63% among those 50 years of age and older.

Americans took little notice of the reunification of Germany. Only 22% said they followed news about that historic event very closely. Interest was only slightly higher among older people (26%) who presumably have more of a personal connection to the event.

The upcoming elections have so far failed to capture the close attention of the American public. Nationwide, only 18% said they were following news about the candidates and the elections in their state very closely. Interest in the races is only marginally higher in those states

that have closely contested Senate or Gubernatorial races. By our analysis, 60% of the national population lives in such states -- and in these states only 20% of the public report that they have been following news about the upcoming election campaign very closely.

As in previous Times Mirror surveys, the public gives a better than average rating to the quality of Gulf coverage, with 30% rating it as excellent. In contrast, 13% of those who said the budget battle was the story they were following most closely, rated that coverage as excellent. Gasoline price hike news received an even lower excellent rating -- and fully 57% rated coverage of this story as only fair or poor. The survey provides no indication of the specific complaints that the public has with the coverage of this story.

### The Budget Crisis

The survey also found that 35% of the public favored the deficit reduction plan proposed by President Bush and the bipartisan leadership of Congress, while 41% opposed it.

There is a stunning age break in these numbers. Americans over 50 opposed the plan by a margin of 50-29 percent, while those under 30 favored it by 41-33. Middle-aged Americans divided about evenly, with 36 percent favoring and 37 percent opposing the deficit reduction package.

In addition, the survey found that the public now places slightly more confidence in the Democratic congressional leadership's ability to make wise decisions on reducing the federal deficit than in President Bush's judgment on this issue.

The Democrats were cited by 29 percent of the public, the president by 25 percent, and the congressional Republicans by 18 percent. Another 17 percent volunteered "none of the above," and 11 percent said they didn't know.

Part of the President's difficulties with the public are reflected in the views of grass-roots Republicans, who divide almost evenly between the GOP's congressional leadership and the President on the question of who will make wise decisions about reducing the budget deficit. Thirty-nine percent have more confidence in congressional Republicans; 36 percent place more trust in the President.

## What Does The Public Know?

Forty-five percent of the public knew, on an unprompted basis, that gasoline taxes had been targeted for an increase as part of the bipartisan deficit reduction package, but only 11 percent volunteered "increased Medicare taxes" as part of the package.

Cigarette taxes were cited by 38 percent of respondents, taxes on alcoholic beverages by 40 percent. Five percent cited increased income taxes for wealthy Americans, and another 5 percent said income taxes generally.

One percent mentioned taxes on airplane tickets, 15 percent cited other taxes, and 33 percent said that without assistance they couldn't recall any specific tax provisions at all.

Fifty-eight percent of those surveyed said they had not seen President Bush's televised speech on the budget deficit, while 17 percent said they saw the entire address and 25 percent said they saw part of it.

Only 44 percent of respondents knew that the decision not to reduce the tax on capital gains was a defeat for President Bush. Twenty-seven percent said it was a victory for the president, and 29 percent said they didn't know.

### The Public And The Rest of The News

Close to four in ten reported that they had heard a lot about the case of alleged sexual harassment of a female reporter by members of the New England Patriots. The gender breakdown on hearing a lot about the story was 50% men vs. 31% women.

One in five (21%) reported hearing a lot about the PBS Civil War documentary and the MPAA's dropping of the X rating in favor of a NC 17 rating had the same level of penetration (20% heard a lot about it). Fewer (16%) said they had heard a lot about the Mapplethorpe obscenity trial in Cincinnati. Awareness of the case was twice as great among college graduates (33%).

Only 4% reported hearing a lot about Khrushchev's memoirs.

## SURVEY METHODOLOGY

The survey results are based on telephone interviews conducted under the direction of Princeton Survey Research Associates among 1,213 adults, 18 years of age or older, during the period of October 4-7, 1990. Interviewing services were provided by The Gallup Organization in Lincoln, Nebraska. For results based on the total sample, one can say with 95% confidence that the error attributable to sampling and other random effects is plus or minus 3 percentage points. In addition to sampling error, one should bear in mind that question wording and practical difficulties in conducting surveys can introduce error or bias into the findings of opinion polls.
