Public Interest and Awareness of the News

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GULF STILL TOP STORY; INTEREST IN FALTERING ECONOMY SURGES

Interest in news about the economy and the election campaigns increased markedly in the past month, but the crisis in the Gulf continued to be the story most closely followed by the American public.

For the fourth consecutive month, approximately two-thirds of Times Mirror's nationwide sample (62%) reported that it was following the Iraqi occupation of Kuwait and the presence of American military forces in the Gulf very closely. And despite the significance of the budget deficit agreement and the outcome of the mid-term elections, a vast majority of the public (66%) continued to think that news about the Gulf crisis was the most important news of the past month. Just 10% felt that way about election news.

Interest in the plight of the hostages was the second most closely followed story of the month (49% followed very closely) but attentiveness to news about the hostages continues to be below the levels recorded in the first few months of the crisis when over half said they were following such stories very closely (57% in August).

Domestically, interest in the condition of the economy has reached a high point for the year and rivals the level of interest expressed by the public in the October 1987 stock market crash. Forty percent of the public followed news of that financial calamity very closely.

News about the condition of the economy in the past four weeks attracted the close attention of 39% of Americans. This is significantly higher than the level of interest found in September (29%), which was significantly higher than had been found in a comparable measure in May of this year (18%).

As in previous surveys, younger people were far less interested in economic news than older people (27% among 18-29 year olds vs. 47% among those 50 & older) and interest among men and college graduates surpassed interest among women and those with less education.

Thirty-eight percent of the public followed news about the elections and the campaigns in their states, which is close to the estimated percentage of the voting age population that actually cast a ballot (36%). The Times Mirror surveys provide evidence as to how late in the game much of the public turns its attention to election news. A month ago, as the campaigns hit full stride, only 18% were paying close attention to election news.

Like voter turnout itself, interest in election news was much greater among older people than among younger Americans. Fifty-two percent of those 50 years of age and older paid close attention to the campaigns in their state while only 27% among those under 30 years of age did so.

The public paid closer attention to campaign news in states that had the most dramatic elections. Forty-six percent of voters followed election news very closely in North Carolina, Texas, Massachusetts, California and Minnesota, all of which had hotly contested elections that drew national media attention.

Although the budget deficit negotiations reached a crescendo and conclusion in late October, public interest in this story remained at the level recorded a month earlier (34%), and a majority of the American public failed to take notice that the much debated agreement was eventually reached.

Only 46% knew that Congress adjourned having achieved an agreement, while 30% thought it adjourned without one and 24% had no idea! Age and education were closely related to the public's lack of knowledge in this area - only 31% of Americans under 30 years of age knew that an agreement was reached, while 65% of college graduates were aware of it.

Those aware of the agreement opposed it by a 12 percentage point margin (35% favor, 47% oppose). This is about the same level of disfavor found a month ago with regard to the initial agreement proposed by the Administration and the Congressional leadership.

However the public was less able to recall most specific tax hikes called for by the actual agreement than it had been about the leadership agreement. Thirty-seven percent recalled an increase in gasoline taxes compared to 45% four weeks ago. In the current survey 31% cited an increase in excise taxes on alcohol and 30% on cigarettes - a month ago a proposed tax increase on these items was recalled by 40% and 38% respectively.

While awareness of most product taxes decreased over the one month period, there was an increase in the percentage of the public recalling higher income taxes, especially tax hikes for the wealthy. Spontaneous mentions of increased income taxes rose from 5% to 14%, and mentions of higher income taxes for the wealthy rose from 5% to 18%. Awareness of higher taxes on the wealthy was the only item that was meaningfully greater among those who favored the budget deficit agreement than among those opposed to it (34% to 24%).

Criticisms of President Bush for changes of heart on taxes and for being seemingly inconsistent on Persian Gulf policy attracted about as much public attention as did the budget deficit agreement itself, with 32% of Times Mirror respondents saying they paid very close attention to this matter. Democrats expressed more interest in criticisms (38%) than Republicans (28%).

With the crisis in the Gulf and a full plate of domestic news, unfolding events in the Soviet Union are for the most part being ignored by the American public. Only 6% said they were very closely following news about continuing political unrest in the Ukraine and other Soviet republics. Another 22% said they were following these stories *fairly* closely.

The murder of militant Rabbi Meir Kahane in New York City attracted a comparable level of public attention - 8% very interested and 21% fairly interested.

Evaluations of Press Coverage

The public continues to rate the coverage of the Gulf crisis better than most major news stories and this month better than the budget deficit and election coverage, specifically. However, over the past four months as breaking news represents a smaller portion of Gulf coverage, public ratings tend to be less laudatory than they were at the outset of the crisis. As shown in the table below, the percentage rating Gulf coverage as only fair or poor is nearly twice as great in the current survey (22%) as it was in the August survey (12%).

Washington Achievements

That a majority of the public is unaware that a budget deficit agreement was reached before adjournment should be considered in light of the fact that only one piece of signed legislation penetrated the public's consciousness. Sixty-four percent knew that smoking had been banned on all domestic airline flights. However, fewer than half the public knew that the minimum wage had been increased (46%) and only 43% thought that new environmental laws to reduce air pollution were passed.

Other pieces of legislation were even more invisible to the public. Twenty-five percent thought that new anti-crime legislation was passed into law, and only about one in five Americans knew of the change in farm subsidies (22%), a low income housing bill (21%), and a change in immigration laws (19%).

The public was also poorly informed about vetoed legislation. Almost as many believed a family leave bill was passed and signed into law as knew it had not (19% vs. 23%). Twenty-seven percent believed a new civil rights law was signed and passed, while 29% knew that it had not. For all the controversy surrounding these vetoes, there was not much more awareness of them among groups in the population who are most directly affected by the legislation. Only 29% of non-whites knew that an anti-discrimination bill failed to make it and 20% of women under 40 years of age knew that the family leave bill failed to pass.

Some groups however are more attentive to their special interests - 47% of people over 50 years of age knew there had *not* been a cut in social security taxes versus 29% among those under 50 years of age!

SURVEY METHODOLOGY

The survey results are based on telephone interviews conducted under the direction of Princeton Survey Research Associates among 1,208 adults, 18 years of age or older, during the period of November 8-11, 1990. For results based on the total sample, one can say with 95% confidence that the error attributable to sampling and other random effects is plus or minus 3 percentage points. In addition to sampling error, one should bear in mind that question wording and practical difficulties in conducting surveys can introduce error or bias into the findings of opinion polls.
