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IT'S STILL THE ECONOMY ... MR. CLINTON

Despite an upsurge in consumer confidence, the attention of the American public continues to be focused on the economy. Nearly two out of three Americans (62%) believes that the economy is still either in a recession, or in a depression, while only 34% of the public thinks that an economic recovery has begun.

The public's continued economic concerns are underscored by the sustained interest expressed in news about the economy and in the public's unusually high level of information about economic problems. *Times Mirror's latest News Interest Index* survey found 72% of its respondents able to recall the names of major corporations that had announced impending layoffs, with as many as four in ten able to recall unprompted IBM and General Motors cutbacks. In contrast, only 21% of the public could name a Clinton appointee - with just 8% recalling Lloyd Bentsen, Clinton's best known choice.

In a news period, that included the transition, a worsening war in Bosnia and a host of major events, only the deployment of U.S. forces to Somalia attracted more public attention than reports about the condition of the U.S. economy. Forty-two percent of respondents to Times Mirror's telephone survey said they followed news about economic conditions *very closely*, while 52% reported paying *very close* attention to reports about the deployment of U.S. forces to Somalia.

Other major news stories of the period attracted considerably less public attention, even though they drew large audiences in absolute terms: the strategic arms agreement (26%), Bush's presidential pardon (23%), Clinton's appointments (24%) and the Clinton economic conference (21%).

Times Mirror surveys have found a steady level of public interest in economic news over the past two and a half years. Before the recession, such surveys rarely found major economic stories being followed very closely by as much as 30% of the public. Since then, interest in economic news has not fallen below the 35% mark. In the current survey, it was higher in the hard hit East (50%) and Western regions (47%) than in the Midwest (34%) or the South (40%), where the economy has been less troubled.

Bosnia Ignored

Although the deployment of troops to Somalia topped the *Times Mirror News Interest Index* this month, other important international news stories without an explicit U.S. connection attracted small audiences. Most notably, Americans continue to be indifferent to the war in Bosnia - 15% said they followed news about the Balkan war very closely. This marks only a marginal improvement over the 10% who said they followed news about the conflict very closely in Times Mirror's September sampling.

American lack of interest in Bosnia is matched by how little the public knows about the basics of the conflict. Just 21% could name the Serbs as the ethnic group that was besieging Sarajevo. 20% were able to answer this question in Times Mirror's September poll, reflecting no gain in the public's level of information over the past four months.

Other questions further documented the public's fundamental lack of understanding of the conflict. Only 32% were able to answer correctly a multiple choice question about the principal reason the Serbs and Bosnians are fighting. As many said the Bosnians were trying to expel the Serbs (32%), as said that Serbian claims to large parts of Bosnia was the reason for the war.

Although the term "ethnic cleansing" has become emblematic of the horrors of the Bosnian war, only one in three Americans were able to give a reasonably correct definition of its meaning. Sixty-one percent of college graduates could define the term correctly. But people under 30 years of age, less well-educated and people who say they rely on television exclusively for their news were much less likely than others to know about this aspect of the Balkan war.

Indifference to the war in Bosnia plays out importantly in American attitudes toward the war. Thirty percent of Times Mirror's sample said they sided with the Bosnians in the conflict, and only 8% reported favoring the Serbs. However, most Americans said explicitly they favored neither side, or had no opinion (62%). Among people who said they followed news about the conflict very closely there was a little more support for the Bosnian side (41%), but a plurality of the attentive public (48%) expressed support for neither side.

Only that very small segment of the public that knows a great deal about the dispute takes sides. As shown in the table below, 72% of those who knew the correct answers to all three quiz questions asked in the poll were sympathetic to the Bosnians. No opinion was the plurality view of all segments of the public with less knowledge about the dispute.

With few Americans following the conflict or taking sides, there is little basic support for American intervention in the conflict. By a 55% to 32% margin respondents opposed rather than favored the use of military force to help end the fighting there. There was also plurality opposition to the use of American force when the question was posed in terms of "preventing Bosnia from being taken over by the Serbs"; 36% favored, 47% opposed the use of military force for that purpose.

The attentive and informed elements of the public seem little more disposed to U.S. involvement in the Balkan war than those who have paid less attention to the conflict and or know less about it. For example, only 44% of those who said they have followed the conflict very closely favor the use of U.S. force.

Royals Snubbed

Americans are not only ignoring Bosnia but other major international stories as well. Only 13% of the Times Mirror sample said they were paying close attention to news about attacks on foreigners in Germany by neo-Nazis, and only 10% reported following the Israeli expulsion of Moslem fundamentalists. Even troubles in the Royal household got short shrift from the public,

with only 11% saying they paid close attention to the end of Prince Charles and Diana's marriage.

The considerably higher levels of interest in news about the Start II treaty and about Bush's pardon of former Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger reflected the substantially greater interest of older Americans in both of these Cold War linked stories. (SEE Table on page 7). In contrast, public attentiveness to Clinton's appointments and to the economic conference in Little Rock was nearly as high among younger people, as it was among people 50 and older, who are routinely heavier consumers of national political stories.

Clinton Appointments Praised

Americans of all ages believed that Bill Clinton has met his pledge to reflect the makeup of the country by naming more women and members of minorities to high level posts. Sixty-eight percent feel that Clinton has made more minority and female appointments than past presidents. Women were as likely as men to subscribe to this view (68% women vs. 67% men). However, non-whites (53%) less often applauded Clinton's efforts in this direction than did whites (70%).

Traditionally, Americans give new Presidents a fresh start and the benefit of the doubt and this tendency is very much in evidence in evaluations of the President-elect. Bill Clinton is given about the same rating as was George Bush four years ago for doing a good job of explaining his policies and plans for the future. Sixty-two percent approved of Clinton's efforts in this direction (65% approved of Bush in a March '89 Gallup Poll).

Clinton Seen as Trustworthy

In considering Bill Clinton in more personal terms, the vast majority describe him as "warm and friendly" (90%), "well informed" (79%), and give him high marks as a "good communicator" (84%). Moreover, despite the long primary and general election campaigns where opponents focused attacks on questions of character and trust, more Americans describe Clinton as "trustworthy" than not by a wide margin of 63% to 29%, with the remainder not expressing a judgment.

Democrats, Republicans and Independents alike give Clinton high marks for warmth, being well informed and possessing good communication skills. The only apparent partisan vestige of the campaign season is in ratings of trust, where more Republicans feel Clinton is not trustworthy (56%) than that he is (36%). Democrats (84%) were slightly more likely than Independents (62%) to describe Clinton as "trustworthy."

Although running as a centrist Democrat and choosing a largely mainstream cabinet, Clinton is clearly viewed as falling much closer to the left end of the political spectrum. When asked whether Clinton was more accurately described as a liberal or conservative -- (respondents were not presented with the response option of describing him as a moderate) -- fully two-thirds (68%) of the public categorized him as a liberal compared to just 19% who said he was a conservative. The remaining 13% did not express an opinion.

Liberal Groups Seen as Gaining in Influence

The predominant view that Clinton has liberal leanings is also seen in the public's view of how power may be redistributed after January 20th. The Times Mirror survey asked whether people thought each of 13 groups would gain or lose influence in Washington with the change of administration. Environmentalists, minorities, women's groups, environmentalists, younger people and children are seen as the biggest winners, along with poor people.

Perhaps owing to Vice President-elect Gore's well publicized link to ecological concerns, "environmentalists" are perceived to be a clear winner in the change of administrations -- 67%

expect them to gain influence, while just 7% say they will lose influence, with the remainder saying there will either be no change or expressing no opinion. The figures are similarly lopsided for minorities, with more feeling Blacks will gain rather than lose influence by a margin of 66% to 6%, and more feeling Hispanics will gain rather than lose by a similar 52% to 7% division. Relatedly, the vast majority see "poor people" as gaining rather than losing influence by the change in administrations (61% to 12%).

Activists for social change are also seen as beneficiaries of the shift in power in Washington. More feel that "feminists" will gain rather than lose power by a ratio of 11 to 1 -- 66% to 6%. Similarly, a majority feel "gay activists" will have their influence enhanced (53%) while just a small fraction (12%) feel it will be reduced.

Clinton Impact on Ordinary People and Power Brokers Less Clear

While the public is clear as to who will gain in influence in Washington when Clinton comes to town, the public is more equivocal about whether the power brokers will *lose influence* and uncertain as to whether ordinary people gain in influence.

"Washington lobbyists" are the only group among the 13 which the public felt will *lose* (31%) rather than gain influence. But, a large number (29%) think there will be no change in their influence or are unsure (17%) as to how their influence might change. Similarly, the verdict is mixed on how "Business Corporations" will fare under the Clinton administration -- 34% gain, 33% lose influence -- they ranked 12th out of the 13 groups asked about. And while slightly more felt that "Union Leaders" would gain (35%) rather than lose (24%) influence under the Clinton administration, they too ranked in the bottom three groups.

Survey respondents rated "people like yourself" in the middle of the pack as recipients of newly found Washington power. Overall, 43% said they expected to gain influence, while 22% expected to lose influence. Just over one-quarter (27%) said they did not expect their influence to change with the new administration, and 8% expressed no opinion.

This overall mixed assessment obscures some stark differences when various population groups are looked at separately. By a margin of 67% to 14% more Blacks feel that "people like yourself" will gain rather than lose influence. The margin for Hispanics is 54% to 9%, while white respondents are divided 41% to 23%. Women (46% gain to 20% lose) were about as likely as men (40% to 24%) to see possible benefits of the change in administration for people like themselves. Finally, Democrats were far more likely to feel people like themselves would gain (63%) rather than lose (9%) power. Conversely, more Republicans felt people like them would lose (38%) rather than gain (22%) power with the change from the Bush to Clinton administration.

Media Performance

The press was given a better rating for its coverage of Somalia than for coverage of other major news stories this month, despite press controversies associated with coverage of the landings. Thirty percent rated coverage of Somalia as *excellent* and only 21% gave the coverage negative ratings. All other stories this month received higher negative ratings (28%) and lower excellent ratings (21%).

It is not unusual for a breaking news story, especially one involving U.S. troops to get better coverage than less action driven stories. However, the rating of Somalia's coverage was less positive than public evaluations of news coverage of other recent military actions. Compared to the 30% who rated Somalia coverage as excellent, 38% rated coverage of the Invasion of

Panama as excellent (Jan '90), and 40% rated coverage of the War in the Gulf as excellent (Jan '91).

Relatively lower ratings may in part reflect the view that the story was initially overcovered. Two out of three Times Mirror respondents reported that they watched live coverage of the Marine landings in Mogadishu and 62% of these viewers thought there was too much coverage of the event. Few Americans who are critical of the overcoverage of the landing fault the military (19%); most (67%) blame the press.

As it has been since the Gulf War, CNN got better ratings from the public than the broadcast news units for covering the news lately. Eighty-three percent of Times Mirror respondents said they relied on television for news about national and international news, 52% newspapers, 17% radio and 5% magazines. Looked at another way, 43% of Times Mirror's respondents said they relied *both* on a print source and on tv for their national and international news, 40% said they relied on *tv exclusively*, and 14% said they relied on a *print source only*. As has been shown consistently in previous Times Mirror surveys, people who rely on television exclusively score consistently lower on news quiz questions than those who use some print source. The Amy Fisher Phenomenon

Four in ten Americans (41%) watched at least one of the made for TV Amy Fisher movies that aired in recent weeks. No less than 18% of the public watched two or more of the films about the Long Island teenager. There was a negative correlation between watching Amy Fisher movies and knowing about events in Bosnia. Fifty percent of Americans who knew nothing about the Bosnian conflict watched an Amy Fisher movie, while only 15% of informed Americans had that experience.

SURVEY METHODOLOGY

The survey results are based on telephone interviews conducted among a nationwide sample of 1,216 adults, 18 years of age or older, during the period January 3-6, 1993. For results based on the total sample, one can say with 95% confidence that the error attributable to sampling and other random effects is plus or minus 3 percentage points.

In addition to sampling error, one should bear in mind that question wording and practical difficulties in conducting surveys can introduce error or bias into the findings of opinion polls.
