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## BELIEVABILITY OF NBC NEWS SUFFERS AFTER STAGING GM TRUCK EXPLOSION

The believability of NBC News has been diminished in the eyes of the public after it admitted that it staged the explosion of a General Motors truck during a segment of the newsmagazine program "Dateline NBC."

NBC News has gone from having the highest believability scores of the three major networks to now having the lowest, according to the latest Times Mirror News Interest Index. In a nationwide poll of 2001 adults, conducted February $12-21,73 \%{ }^{1}$ gave NBC News a high believability rating, while $24 \%$ gave it a low rating. Four years ago NBC News was evaluated more positively ( $79 \%-16 \%$ ).

In the earlier survey it achieved higher ratings than ABC (76\%-17\%), and CBS (74\%$20 \%$ ). The current poll finds no material change in the believability ratings given ABC News ( $76 \%-21 \%$ ) and CBS News $(75 \%-21 \%)$ over the four year period.

But the distinction of having the most "believable" network news division no longer belongs to the big three broadcast networks. CNN now gets the highest believability ratings $76 \%-14 \%$. In August 1989, CNN had a $64 \%-13 \%$ believability rating.

The trend survey also found somewhat fewer Americans rating their daily newspaper as believable ( $63 \%-33 \%$ currently vs. $67 \%-31 \%$ in 1989). But the Associated Press experienced more significant slippage in its believability scores (55\%-30\% currently vs. $64 \%-22 \%$, four years ago).

The drop in the believability of NBC News was the most striking finding in the monthly Times Mirror News Interest Index. To no one's surprise, President Clinton dominated the stories the public is following very closely.

President Clinton's economic plan and reports about the condition of the U.S. economy were followed "very closely" by $49 \%$ of the respondents to Times Mirror's telephone survey.

Other stories followed very closely last month were: President Clinton's attempt to lift the ban on gays in the military (45\%), creation of a White House task force on health care (28\%), accounts about U.S. troops in Somalia (28\%), the Zoe Baird/Kimba Wood story (24\%), and the civil war in Bosnia (15\%).

[^0]While interest in the gays in the military story was surprisingly high, President Clinton's opponent on the issue, General Colin Powell, gets much higher believability scores than the President himself.

General Powell received a believability score of $55 \%-24 \%$, while President Clinton received a score of $53 \%-44 \%$. Geraldo Rivera had the distinction of being the least believable person tested -- $22 \%$ of the respondents found him believable while $70 \%$ said they believed almost nothing of what he said.

Rivera barely beat out the president of General Motors in unbelievability. The president of GM received a believability rating of $25 \%-60 \%$.

President Clinton's believability score is well below George Bush's rating four years ago ( $63 \%-36 \%$ ), but the former President's current rating has fallen $20 \%$ points since 1989 ( $43 \%$ $56 \%)$.

When asked to handicap the Oscar race for Best Picture, Times Mirror's respondents had a strong favorite: A Few Good Men. Thirty-five percent said the military courtroom drama should win the Oscar, while 13\% selected Scent of a Woman, 12\% chose Unforgiven, and 4\% each cited The Crying Game and Howard's End.

When you analyze the data in terms of the people who have seen each movie, A Few Good Men has the most intense supporters. Forty-eight percent of the people who saw that film thought it should win the Oscar. Scent of a Woman received $44 \%$ support on this measure, while The Crying Game (34\%), Howard's End (33\%), and Unforgiven (24\%) received less intense support from moviegoers.

## SURVEY METHODOLOGY

The survey results are based on telephone interviews conducted under the direction of Princeton Survey Research Associates among two nationwide samples of adults, 18 years of age or older. The first survey which dealt with media believability was conducted during the period February 12-21, 1993 among 2001 adults. The second survey was conducted during the period February 20-23, 1993 among 1516 adults it covered the News Interest Index and Oscar questions. For results based on the 2001 sample, one can say with $95 \%$ confidence that the error attributable to sampling and other random effects is plus or minus 2 percentage points and for results based on the 1516 sample, the sampling error is plus or minus 3 percentage points.

In addition to sampling error, one should bear in mind that question wording and practical difficulties in conducting surveys can introduce error or bias into the findings of opinion polls.
