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Quake and Kerrigan Vie for Public Attention Public Sympathetic To Inman Charges

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PUBLIC SYMPATHETIC TO INMAN CHARGES

While very few Americans followed news of Bobby Ray Inman's abrupt withdrawal as nominee for secretary of defense, many agree with the criticisms he made of the press in explaining his departure from public life.

A growing number of Americans think that press coverage of the personal and ethical behavior of politicians is excessive. Few think it's "very responsible", and many see it as discouraging qualified people from going into public office. Americans also think the press plays a more powerful agenda-setting role than political leaders in Washington, or other leadership groups.

In a nationwide Times Mirror telephone survey conducted this past weekend, 59% said that press coverage of the personal lives and ethical behavior of political leaders is excessive. Fifty-two percent expressed that opinion in a 1989 nationwide poll.

Only 13% in the current survey rated this type of news coverage as *very* responsible. Most (56%) graded the press as only *fairly* responsible, or as *not* responsible (29%) in the way it covered such stories.

The poll found that although a large majority of the public (66%) continues to see the press as playing an important watchdog role, considerably fewer than five years ago think the media is helping to weed out the kind of politicians who should not be in office. Now, 45% feel that way, vs. 60% in 1989.

But by a two-to-one margin (64% vs. 31%), the public thinks that the bigger problem is that press coverage these days discourages qualified people from serving in public life, rather than fails to weed out unfit political leaders.

Three out of four Times Mirror respondents who followed news of Inman's withdrawal¹ saw some truth in the retired Admiral's charges that the news media is "constantly critical of, and hostile toward public figures." However, most in the poll (58%) felt that while his charges were true, they were an exaggeration. Only 17% thought they were completely true. Twenty-one percent of those polled thought his criticisms of the media were not true. But people who followed Inman's story *very* closely more often saw his charges as untrue (32%), than those who followed the controversy less closely (17%).

Democrats Sour

Mounting public criticism of press coverage of the personal lives and ethical behavior of political figures is apparent in all demographic and political groups. However, discontent with press performance in this area has risen most sharply among Democrats. In 1989, the first year of the Bush presidency, 47% of Democrats compared to 58% of Republicans thought that this type of news coverage was excessive. Five years later, Democrats lead Republicans (64% to 56%) in faulting the press for its obsession with scandal in high places.

In that regard, the poll finds the public divided along partisan lines as to who is most responsible for making an issue of Whitewater. Overall, 42% held the press responsible, while 47% blamed Clinton's political opponents for harping on Clinton's failed real estate investment in Arkansas. Republicans more often blamed the press (56%), while Democrats blamed Clinton's political enemies (61%).

Surprisingly, however, given the general view of the press' obsession with scandal, the attentive public² does not think the press is pushing too hard on Whitewater. Of those following news of the issue closely, 63% said it was important for the news media to push hard to learn the facts in this case, while only 34% thought the media is pushing too hard. Partisanship predictably colored respondent views on this question, but political independents were strongly of the view that the press was not overly covering Whitewater.

Agenda-Setting Media

Pluralities of Americans of all political persuasions, and in all major demographic groups, think the news media plays the most influential role in determining what issues and events are considered important in this country. Forty-three percent of those surveyed by Times Mirror named the press as the most important agenda-setting group, compared to 22% who cited political leadership in Washington. Other leadership groups named less often included business leaders (11%), Hollywood (10%) and religious leaders (7%).

The media's agenda setting power not withstanding, the public does not think that the press is exaggerating the amount of violence in the country these days. A two-thirds majority (64%) thinks the press accurately reflects the level of crime, while only 28% thinks the level is exaggerated.

In fact, the poll finds that the public ranks crime just below improving the job situation as the problem to which President Clinton should give top priority. Improving the job situation was named by 26% of survey respondents in this regard. Reducing crime was named next most often (by 22%), followed by reducing the budget deficit (20%), reforming the welfare system (15%) and reforming health care (14%).

Opinions about the President's priorities in last weekend's survey are similar to those recorded in a December nationwide Times Mirror poll, except that welfare reform received somewhat more priority in the current survey than in the earlier one (33% named it as first or second priority, compared to 25% in December)

Health Care Reform Cools

It is noteworthy that in both polls reforming health care was given lower priority than most other issues tested. But in absolute terms, health care reform is still regarded as an important issue by most Americans. Three in four of those questioned said that the U.S. health care system should either be completely rebuilt (42%) or that it needs fundamental changes (33%). Only 21% characterized the system as working pretty well and requiring only minor changes.

However, on a trend basis, these figures represent some erosion of zeal for health care reform. In April 1993, as many as 55% thought the system should be rebuilt, and only 15% thought the system was working well. The lessened belief that the health care system requires radical re-structuring was more apparent among *Democrats* than among Republicans or Independents, falling from 70% to 44% among self-ascribed Democrats.

The News Interest Index

The attack on figure skater Nancy Kerrigan competed closely for public attention with natural disasters across the country last month, and far outdistanced interest in two melodramatic criminal stories: the trials of Lorena Bobbitt and the Menendez brothers.

Fully 45% of respondents said they paid *very close* attention to the Kerrigan story in which ex-husband and other associates of rival Tonya Harding are accused of maiming/bruising the graceful Kerrigan to insure a place for Harding on the Olympic team.

The earthquake in Southern California was followed very closely by 63% of the public, while the Big Chill in the Northeast and Midwest drew 51%. These audiences, although smaller, were roughly comparable to similar events in the past, including the San Francisco earthquake of November, 1989, followed very closely by 73%; and the Midwest floods last summer, by 65%.

Attention to the Kerrigan affair was extraordinary for a story of an individual, famous or otherwise, caught up in tragedy or criminal conspiracy. It ran counter to the typical pattern in which public interest wanes quickly after the initial expose, perhaps because of repulsion toward the crime.

The Kerrigan story attracted almost twice the audience of the trial of Mrs. Bobbitt, accused of sexually mutilating her husband, which was followed very closely by 26%. It was almost quadruple the 12% who followed very closely the trial of the two Menendez brothers who murdered their parents. Mike Tyson's rape trial in February, 1992, drew 32%; the lifetime banishment of Pete Rose from baseball in September, 1989, drew 30%; the William Kennedy Smith rape trial in December, 1991, 27%; and the death of Hank Gathers, a college basketball player on the court, during an April, 1990, game, 26%.

Bobbitt Backlash

Moreover, in the latest survey, when the public was asked which *single story* of the month it had followed *most* closely, Kerrigan was barely nosed out by the California earthquake, 23% to 21%. At the other extreme, the one story which received too much coverage, according to 51% of the public, was the Bobbitt case; no other story came close in this respect.

The Kerrigan story also eclipsed interest in various political stories, including the Clinton health care reform proposal, which was followed very closely by 38%; and in reports about the national economy, followed very closely by 34%. It also topped President Clinton's first State of the Union address, at 26%; this was precisely the same proportion of Americans who followed very closely the State of the Union message of former President George Bush two years earlier.

In terms of quality of coverage of the month's major stories, the public gave the lowest grade to health care reform, highest to the cold spell in the east and midwest. Asked to rate coverage of the story they had followed most closely, only 10% of respondents said excellent on health

care, compared to 48% who said excellent on the Big Chill. In between were the Los Angeles earthquake (33%), the attack on Kerrigan (31%), and the Lorena Bobbitt story (30%).

Demographically, young people aged 18 to 29, particularly young women in that age group, were much more interested in Kerrigan than the earthquake. Young women were also more interested in the Bobbitt case than in the earthquake. Not surprisingly, more Westerners paid most attention to the earthquake, but Easterners followed Kerrigan more closely than they did the big temblor and even their own record cold weather snap.

SURVEY METHODOLOGY

ABOUT THIS SURVEY

The survey results are based on telephone interviews conducted under the direction of Princeton Survey Research Associates among a nationwide sample of 1,207 adults, 18 years of age or older, during the period January 27-30, 1994. For results based on the total sample, one can say with 95% confidence that the error attributable to sampling and other random effects is plus or minus 3 percentage points.

In addition to sampling error, one should bear in mind that question wording and practical difficulties in conducting surveys can introduce error or bias into the findings of opinion polls.

SURVEY METHODOLOGY IN DETAIL

The sample for this survey is a random digit sample of telephone numbers selected from telephone exchanges in the continental United States. The random digit aspect of the sample is used to avoid "listing" bias and provides representation of both listed and unlisted numbers (including not-yet-listed). The design of the sample ensures this representation by random generation of the last two digits of telephone numbers selected on the basis of their area code, telephone exchange, and bank number.

The telephone exchanges were selected with probabilities proportional to their size. The first eight digits of the sampled telephone numbers (area code, telephone exchange, bank number) were selected to be proportionally stratified by county and by telephone exchange within county. That is, the number of telephone numbers randomly sampled from within a given county is proportional to that county's share of telephone households in the U.S. Estimates of the number of telephone households within each county are derived from 1990 Census data on residential telephone incidence that have been updated with state-level information on new telephone installations and county-level projections of the number of households. Only working banks of telephone numbers are selected. A working bank is defined as 100 contiguous telephone numbers containing three or more residential listings.

The sample was released for interviewing in replicates. Using replicates to control the release of sample to the field ensures that the complete call procedures are followed for the entire sample.

At least three attempts were made to complete an interview at every sampled telephone number. The calls were staggered over times of day and days of the week to maximize the chances of making a contact with a potential respondent. All interview breakoffs and refusals were re-contacted at least once in order to attempt to convert them to completed interviews. In each contacted household, interviewers asked to speak with the "youngest male 18 or older who is at home". If there is no eligible man at home, interviewers asked to speak with "the oldest woman 18 or older who lives in the household". This systematic respondent selection technique has been shown empirically to produce samples that closely mirror the population in terms of age and gender.

Non-response in telephone interview surveys produces some known biases in survey-derived estimates because participation tends to vary for different subgroups of the population, and these subgroups are likely to vary also on questions of substantive interest. In order to compensate for these known biases, the sample data are weighted in analysis.

The demographic weighting parameters are derived from a special analysis of the most recently available Census Bureau's Current Population Survey (March 1992). This analysis produced population parameters for the demographic characteristics of households with adults 18 or older, which are then compared with the sample characteristics to construct sample weights. The analysis only included households in the continental United States that contain a telephone.

The weights are derived using an iterative technique that simultaneously balances the distributions of all weighting parameters. After an optimum sample balancing solution is reached, the weights were constrained to fall within the range of 1 to 5. This constraint is useful to ensure that individual respondents do not exert an inordinate effect on the survey's overall results.
