INTRODUCTION

At the beginning of each month the Times Mirror Center for the People and the Press conducts a nationwide survey to monitor public attentiveness to the major news events of the preceding four weeks. The survey measures how closely the public follows top national and international news stories, obtains public reaction to the media coverage of these stories and attempts to find out how well informed the public is about the people and events that have made news during the month.

Since the survey is a continuing one, waves of interviewing can be combined to produce large data sets for special analyses that address important questions about how the public reacts to news.

This is a report on one such analysis designed to examine the correspondence between what the public follows, and what types of news media the public uses. More specifically, an extensive tabular analysis is presented showing the relationship between media use and how attentive the public is to major news stories and the level of public information about news events.

This analysis is based on 4,890 telephone interviews conducted January-April 1990. Copies of the questionnaires may be found at the back of this report.

Section *one* of this report is a demographic and lifestyle analysis of the various measures of media usage employed in this study.

Section *two* shows the relationship between attentiveness and media use. It also reports on the level of public information about major news stories and use of specific media.

Section *three* reports on a segmentation of the public into four analytical groupings based on media use. This segmentation, or typology, was designed to illustrate broad distinctions between audience types with regard to news attentiveness.

A Methodological Note

The media use measures employed for this study were designed as general indicators of viewership or readership for analytical purposes rather than as precise measures of audience size. For example, we have employed categorical measures in asking people what they read or watch and not asked about specific programs and publications, e.g., readership of "news magazines" rather than readership of *Time*, *Newsweek* or *U.S. News & World Report*. Our "yesterday" media use measures do not include Saturdays through Tuesdays, because interviewing for the News Interest Index is done Thursday through Sunday.

By and large we have used restricted measures as indicators of media use, to account for some over-reporting of media use behavior. We have taken as "audience" only those respondents who say they "regularly" read or view, and have not considered those who say "sometimes" or "seldom". In addition, we typically precede our questions about daily television news and newspaper with a phrase to make it easier for people to tell us they don't watch or read, e.g., "Sometimes people are so busy they often don't get a chance." This tends to produce a lower incidence of usage than those derived by industry sources.

With regard to the segmentation of news consumers, we are mindful that there is, by definition, an arbitrary nature to defining some audiences as "sophisticated" or "serious." But, the decision about how to segment was empirically driven. We attempted to employ the definitions that gave us the most consistent discrimination between groups within the limits of our monthly surveys. That is, we could not ask about media whose audience are so small that they are not meaningfully readable in a 1200 case survey. Nor could we distinguish between the casual and serious audiences of important news organizations. The grouping that we have decided upon "works" for our purposes in showing how various levels of audience differ in what they get out of the news. It is certainly not the only configuration possible, but has proved to be quite revealing as we have employed it.

SECTION I

NEWS CONSUMPTION

Section one of this report is a demographic and lifestyle analysis of the various measures of media usage employed in this study.

Based on 1,207 interviews conducted January 4-7, 1990, 1,245 interviews conducted February 1-4, 1990, 1,226 interviews conducted March 1-4, 1990 and 1,212 interviews conducted April 5-8, 1990.

SECTION II

INTEREST IN THE NEWS AND LEVELS OF PUBLIC
AWARENESS OF NEWS EVENTS BY MEDIA USAGE

Section II of the report discusses the results of the survey on public interest in the news and awareness of news events by media usage. The survey was conducted in 1962 and 1963 and involved a national sample of 1,000 persons. The results show that the majority of the population is interested in the news and that the level of awareness of news events is high. The survey also found that the majority of the population uses the news media, and that the level of awareness of news events is higher among those who use the news media.

Section II of the report discusses the results of the survey on public interest in the news and awareness of news events by media usage. The survey was conducted in 1962 and 1963 and involved a national sample of 1,000 persons. The results show that the majority of the population is interested in the news and that the level of awareness of news events is high. The survey also found that the majority of the population uses the news media, and that the level of awareness of news events is higher among those who use the news media.

Section two shows the relationship between attentiveness and media use. It also reports on the level of public information about major news stories and use of specific media.

Based on 1,207 interviews conducted January 4-7, 1990, 1,245 interviews conducted February 1-4, 1990, 1,226 interviews conducted March 1-4, 1990 and 1,212 interviews conducted April 5-8, 1990.

SURVEY METHODOLOGY

The survey results are based on telephone interviews conducted by The Gallup Organization in Lincoln, Nebraska under the direction of Princeton Survey Research Associates among 1,226 adults, 18 years of age or older, during the period of March 1-4, 1990. For results based on the total sample, one can say with 95% confidence that the error attributable to sampling and other random effects is plus or minus 3 percentage points. In addition to sampling error, one should bear in mind that question wording and practical difficulties in conducting surveys can introduce error or bias into the findings of opinion polls.
